

Three-Dimensional Wholecloth Quilting Materials List A Quilt National '25 Workshop with Brent McGee

For this workshop, students are asked to bring...

2 Yards unbleached white muslin
Brent Says: "The cheap drapey kind is best, as opposed to the stiffer medium weight. If you've got two
yards of plain white lying around, you can use that. I personally like the look of the unbleached muslin
and it's inexpensive."

- <u>Batting Scraps and/or stuffing like Ploy-fil</u>
 Brent Says: "Any type will do for building dimensionality."
- Biggish sturdy needle that's easy to thread Brent Says: "Something more like a sturdy basting needle. I use a self-threading needle. Bring a selection of needles to try."

Cotton hand quilting thread in white or cream Brent Says: "My favorite is Gütterman Hand-Quilting Thread because it's prewaxed and doesn't tangle as easily, plus it's always at Joann for a discount."

- □ <u>Strong silk of poly thread for pulling and holding tight gathers</u> Brent Says: "Cotton tends to break when pulled too tightly."
- □ Snips, scissors, and pins
- □ Chopstick or other stick-like implement for stuffing into tight places

- 20" x 20" square of Hobbs Tuscany 100% Wool Batting Brent Says: "Wool is the best because of how easy it is to hand stitch through. My favorite is Hobbs Tuscany"
- □ Some selection of scissors, pins, needles, batting scraps, and Poly-fil from the Harriet Jacoby Fiber Studio will be accessible.
